Chester BH claimed their sixth Cheshire Cup Final win in nine years, and ninth overall as they ran out comfortable winners over New Brighton at Filkins Lane on September 5th. With his 5-27 leading by example, Harry Killoran tasted success in his first year as skipper in a carnival atmosphere on an historic day when the Chester Ladies 1st XI won the league title on the back pitch.

Put into bat, Chester got off to a solid start adding 54 before Warren Goodwin was caught behind for 25. Rick Moore went on to make 47 and Alex Money added 33, but Chester looked to be heading for an under par total. However, after their terrific partnership at Wallasey in the quarter final, Lee Dixon and Andy Metcalf did it again, Dixon making an unbeaten 53 from 50 balls and Metcalf 47 off just 35 as the pair added 93 for the sixth wicket in 12 overs, enabling Chester to reach 238-6 from their allocation.

The New Brighton reply got off to a dramatic start, George McCormick opening up with a wicket maiden, and although the Wirral side tried to rebuild, they kept losing momentum with wickets falling in the 10th, 13th and 15th overs. That fourth wicket was Ashley Watkins, who made a good 43, which was followed by an impressive fifth wicket partnership of 72 between Dan Cooke (44) and Louis Botes (32) which took New Brighton to 135-4 in the 26th. The breakthrough for CBH was conjured by Rick Moore, trapping Cooke Ibw, and when Botes was caught by Goodwin on the boundary three overs later, the match had taken a decisive turn.

Harry Killoran and Jack Williams then spun CBH to victory as the last four wickets went in under 7 overs. It was a wonderful sun-blessed occasion for such a big game with the locals out in force alongside a great contingent from

New Brighton who more than played their part in a terrific atmosphere.

Peter Davies (Chairman, Cheshire Cricket Board) and David Humpage (Chairman, Cheshire County League) presented the trophy and Geoff Wellstead - on a welcome return from Yorkshire - chose Lee Dixon as man of the match.

CCCL PREMIER LEAGUE



NANTWICH LIFTED THE PREMIER LEAGUE TITLE, THEIR SECOND IN THE PAST THREE COMPLETE SEASONS, HOLDING OFF THE CHALLENGE OF RUNNERS-UP DIDSBURY, WITH CHESTER BH THIRD. CHEADLE AND TIMPERLEY WERE RELEGATED.

A glorious afternoon on Sept 5th saw the title race extended, mathematically at least, into the final weekend after a surprise defeat for leaders Nantwich at Neston. Choosing to bat first, Nantwich put together a healthy enough looking 254, Rob Cook-Seivewright making 63 and keeper Spencer Byatt with a welcome 54. Four wkts apiece from Ash Davis and Chris Hackett saw the Dabbers dismissed in 49 overs. and those extra overs claimed were to prove crucial as Hackett came to the fore again with the bat. His 43 off 38 balls saw 71 added for the 7th wkt in under 12 overs with Dane Williams (58*) after Matt Strong's 63 had given Neston a solid base to build from. Davis hit the winning runs in the 58th over to conclude a brilliant game. Despite their fifth loss of the season, Nantwich took 11 pts from the game. which gave them one hand on the title trophy, their emphatic win over Didsbury the week before assuming even greater significance. Didsbury themselves staged an astonishing recovery to pull off a massive 171 run win at Oulton Park. Choosing to bat, Dids were all over the place at 29-6 before skipper Nick Anderson (58 off 52) was joined by keeper Sam Leech, who hammered a magnificent 94, both batsmen hitting four 6s as they added 105 for the 7th. Leech continued on his merry way with Max Backhouse as they added another 85 for the 8th, Didsbury finishing on a remarkable 256-9, 4 wkts apiece for Ben Gibbon and Martyn East. OP were never at the races as Anderson took 4-26, all out 85 in under 24 overs. Chester BH kept up their pursuit of second spot with another of their trademark tight squeak victories, winning for the second time in 2021 by 1 wkt at Timperley, whose 112 (Jack Williams 4-8) didn't look anywhere near enough. However, Chris Page

(4-53) and Jake Sandham (4-30) set about their work so well that CBH were reeling at 58-7 and then 90-9, before Alex Nash and George McCormick inched them over the line. The result also meant that Timperley - third in 2018 and 2019 - were relegated after a difficult season which has seen them lose the most games (13) in the division. It was also confirmed that Cheadle would be going down with them after they lost by 8 wkts at Oxton, with Chris Stenhouse returning 5-32 and Henry **Dobson** then hitting 73*. Toft banished any lingering relegation concerns with a handsome 110 run win over AE, James Scott smashing 90 off just 39 balls (6x4, 8x6) and adding 118 for the 6th wkt with Toby Drummond (60*) as Toft racked up 277-7. Scott then took the last wkt after Matt Cornes 5-32 saw AE all out 167. Hyde also went big, only one batsman failing to get into double figures as they totalled 283-5 against Widnes, who slumped to 142-6 in reply before a late rally left them 35 runs short on 248. And so to the final day, where Nantwich skipper Ray Doyle led from the front with an unbeaten 100, securing the necessary batting pts for the champions crown as the Dabbers declared after 44 overs on 234-5 at Cheadle. On the ground where he helped win the Cheshire Cup 12 months earlier, Olly Griffiths took 5-27 as the hosts were all out in 27.1 overs, Nantwich winners by 93 runs. Didsbury topped off a fantastic season for the club with a comprehensive win over Neston, Nick Anderson taking

the wicket of Will Evans with the first ball of the match as Neston managed just 90. Dids knocking off the runs in under 14 overs. The two teams then had a game of football on the outfield which saw Neston sneak a 1-0 win! Chester BH won a terrific game with Hyde to finish in third spot in another successful season for them. Tom Partridge (78) and Charlie Barnard (76) added 157 for the 2nd wkt as Hyde totalled 235-7, before Lee Dixon (55*), batting at 8, led a CBH recovery from 146-7 to 239-8. There was an even tenser game at Widnes where Oxton won by just 3 runs. Elsewhere 100 from Rob Sehmi against his former club Toft helped his present club Oulton Park to a 107 run win while, despite recovering from 6-3, Timperley's 175 didn't tax Alderley Edge, who won by 5 wkts in 37.1 overs after another half century opening stand between Ed Foster and Sam Perry.

ON A FINAL DAY WHEN ANY TWO OF FOUR TEAMS COULD GAIN PROMOTION, **BOWDON** BECAME CHAMPIONS, WITH **BROOKLANDS** FINISHING SECOND, THUS TAKING THE OTHER PREMIER DIVISION PLACE. BRAMHALL & BOLLINGTON JUST MISSED OUT.

An astonishing outbreak of good sportsmanship made 5th Sept a remarkable afternoon in Div 1, as all the leading sides did their level best to hand the advantage to everyone else. Bramhall ended the day still on top by a solitary point after holding on for a draw at home to lowly Congleton, who assured their own safety with the better of the match. Put into bat, Mohammad Shabaz Bashir, badly dropped when 4, scored 95, and skipper Jack Goode's run-a-ball 48 took Congleton to a healthy 227-8. which looked even better when Bramhall slumped to 87-8 in reply. However, captain Nick Cantello inspired the lower order as he reached a magnificent 101* with a third six, the last two wickets adding 102 as Bramhall finished on 189-9, four unlikely looking but vital batting pts attained. Their value became even clearer as second place Bowdon lost to Urmston. Declaring after 47 overs on 211-7 (Thomas Graham 56), Matt Tully (4-35) and Chris Ashling (4-30) had Urmston in all kinds of trouble before Sumit Panda (78) and skipper Lewis Jackson (93*) joined forces, Jackson then coaxing an injured Harry Singh as last man to get the 21 needed for a 1 wkt win. Bollington, in third at the start of the day, lost at Sale, the hosts recovering from 49-4 to reach 207-9 before all the home attack took wickets as Bolly could only manage 168. Brooklands, also still pursuing promotion, were frustrated by Grappenhall who reached 193-5 in reply to Brooklands 245-8. Skipper Jack Bagshaw scored 69* while lan Hall scored 39 and took 3-51 for Grappers. The key clash at the bottom ended in tears for Warrington, who lost by 4 wkts in their game with

some weeks previously but they at least had the a moraleboosting first win of the season over Macclesfield, who were shot out for just 69 as Dean Jackson returned a superb 13-6-23-7, Macc losing 9-28 in all after being 41-1. Davenham had an early wobble but reached their target four down. So it was an intriguing last day that held the attention. with Brooklands making the first statement of intent as they recorded a surprisingly comfortable win in good time at Bollington, whose own promotion hopes were shattered as they bowled out for just 96, having been 65-3 at one stage. The Brooklands attack, led by **AJ Hart** (4-27) proved irresistible, Joe Gill wrapping things up with 3-0 as Alex Edwards (40) and David Cunliffe (44*) knocked off the bulk of the target inside 25 overs to ease Brooklands to an 8 wkt win. The relatively early news of this result focused the minds of Bowdon and Bramhall even further, and it was Bowdon who got their part done next as they inched to a 5 wkt win at Marple. The hosts looked in a heap of problems at 48-7 after Matt Tully's 5-32 but Jack Grundy led the lower order resistance, helping his team to total 145, and when Andy

Wylie marked his final game for the club with the early wicket of Pat Ashling, it was very much game on. However, Ross Zelem's 41 led a steady if unspectacular recovery. Bowdon passing their target in the 45th over. It was then all eyes on Dane Rd, where 77 from Viraj Sorathia and 70 from Gareth Davies had helped Sale reach 154-2 against Bramhall before 6-46 from Ryan Macciocchi saw the hosts bowled out for a relatively disappointing 191. Tyrone Lawrence rounded off a fine personal season with the early wickets of both Bramhall openers, leaving Nick Cantello to lead another recovery mission. However, when he fell for 39, the Sale bowlers Isaac Brooks (4-30) and James Dodds (3-43) proved too much for the lower order and Bramhall were all out for 163, ending just 12 pts outside the promotion spots. Elsewhere, Warrington won the battle of the two relegated clubs, beating Davenham by 5 wkts, while Congleton thumped Macc by 172 runs and Urmston concluded an encouraging 2021 by beating Grappenhall.

LINDOW DEALT WITH A PENULTIMATE DAY WOBBLE TO RECORD AN EMPHATIC LAST DAY WIN WHICH SAW THEM CROWNED DIVISION TWO CHAMPIONS. IN A DRAMATIC CLIMAX, ALVANLEY CAME THROUGH TO TAKE THE OTHER PROMOTION SPOT.

A low key series of matches on 5th Sept confirmed the relegation situation as Stockport's remote prospects of survival were obliterated by a 100 run defeat at home to Alvanley, for whom Steve Charles returned 6-19 and kept the Alv in with a shot at promotion, 13 points away from the top two, comprising Romiley and Lindow. Chasing 115 to beat Upton, Romiley found themselves an egregious 23-5 but captain Tom Rolph (35*) and Lewis Clarke (31*) did the necessary to ensure Romiley had it in their own hands on the final day to ensure an immediate return (discounting the 2020 season of course) to Div 1. Lindow, meanwhile, had what for them was a horrible case of history repeating itself, as, with promotion in sight, they snatched defeat from the jaws of victory. All seemed well with the world as Ryan O'Brien's 4-19 were the standout figures that saw Hale Barns muster just 73 although from 37-6 they will have been glad of doubling their score. The returning Ben Hicks (5-35) and Joe Cooper (3-6) then induced a shuddering collapse as Lindow were taking a standing count at 56-8. The last two wickets cobbled together 13 runs but that still left them five from victory when the last wkt fell. Elsewhere there was only pride to play for, with Georgians, Haslington and Ashton OM all recording wins, the latter easing to a 9 wkt win over basement club Barrow, who lost their last 7 wkts for just 10 runs as they ended 119 all out. 46 from Ned Bailey and 39 from Francis Yates helped Stockport Georgians overtake Mobberley's 161, with Abdul Ageel making 76 and Ibrar Latif 47, James Locke taking 5-25. Ben Instead didn't bowl but made a decisive 67* to rescue Haslington from 47-4 and an eventual 5 wkt win over Christleton, who had earlier fallen apart after being 107-1, with Aamir Afzaal's 67 putting the hosts into a strong position. However, Tom Gledhill's 5-36 was instrumental in re-



ducing the visitors to 149 all out. And so to the last day, Sept 11th dawning dry and clear, and it was at last all smiles at Lindow. determined not to repeat their stumble of 2019. They were in complete control against Barrow from the off, Will Espley's 5-27 the pick as the visitors were shot out for just 66. Lindow knocked off the runs in some style, a fusillade of boundaries from Rob Herriott and Jadan Jones seeing them race to 70-0 in less than 6 overs. Romilev had started the day in second but were utterly crestfallen after a chastening decision to field first at Mobberley. Opening pair Sohaib Butt (90) and Ibrar Latif (133) put on a magnificent 215 for the 1st wkt in a stand spanning almost 42 overs, with 27 x 4 and 11 x 6 between them (all 11 sixes hit by Latif). An eye-watering 285-3 meant Romiley took only one bowling point and faced a gargantuan task to win, which was the only way they could take the necessary points. As it was, a disheartened Romiley side were soon on the brink at 86-8, and it took a feisty 65 from no.10 James Bashford, partnering with

James Badrock (74) to provide but the measliest crumb of comfort for the visitors as they were all out 194. Meanwhile, up in the hills near Frodsham, Alvanley went about their task with quiet efficiencv. taking a Hale Barns wicket with the first ball of the match with only lower order defiance getting HB into three figures. Alvanley were clearly a bit jittery as news filtered through of Romiley's struggles, but they did enough to seal a 4 wkt win which proved enough to secure them a spot in Div 1 next season in what has been an amazing 2021 for them. In the other matches Stockport rounded off a disappointing season with a terrific chase of 174 at Haslington, Patrick Firth's 58* overcoming another great effort with the ball from Tom Gledhill (6-46), which left the Cale Green side reflecting on what might have been after they finished just 20 pts from safety, with Upton sufferimg a 13th defeat of the season at the hands of Christleton, who won by 7 wkts in a low scoring encounter. James Locke made it successive 5-wkt hauls for Stockport Georgians as they beat Ashton on Mersey by 4 wkts at Flowery Field to finish strongly.

CCCL 2ND & 3RD XI



Didsbury 2s had to settle for a draw against Oulton Park on Sept 5th but the 13 pts they accrued were enough to secure the 2nd XI Premier Division title. Batting first, the hosts found it difficult to find fluency against a testing OP attack, for whom Ben Ainsworth returned 4-46. Marcus Fisher top scored with 56 to take him past 350 league runs for Didsbury, whose bowlers pegged OP right back, Raza Mian leading the way with 4-35 as OP's last pair had to survive almost 8 overs. Nevertheless, the side that had led the division from the early stages ended up deserved champions. As for OP, they were left with their destiny still in their own hands, 7 points clear of second bottom Macclesfield who had a morale boosting 118 run win over already relegated Marple. An unbroken 6th wkt stand of 79 helped Cheadle beat Hyde by 5 wkts to leave the Werneth Low club still in jeopardy as the last day approached. However, on the 11th it was Macclesfield who went down, a dismal 82 all out leading to a 7 wkt loss against Alderley Edge and next season in Div 1. Bizarrely, Macc were one of only 3 sides to beat champions Didsbury in 2021, but sadly for them could not replicate that form often enough. Oulton Park also lost to Toft but escaped the drop due to Macc's result, finishing just 8 pts ahead. Toft skipper Pete Talbot scored 22* after earlier taking 4-31 as Toft won by 4 wkts and secured for themselves a

highly creditable runners-up spot in an excellent season all round for the club. Hyde drew with CBH to secure their Prem Division status for another season, Didsbury concluded their 2021 with a comfortable win at Neston (who finished third) while a highly entertaining match at Nantwich saw Cheadle knock off 225 from the last ball of the match. Jasper Wong was the Cheadle hero with 82*, while Jake Pearson had earlier made 90 for the Dabbers.

In Div 1 on the 4th, champions Oxton recorded a 14th win of the season, a brilliant 131 from Jack Breheny and 97 from Will Clayton helping them to a 118 run win over Lindow, the pair adding 214 for the 2nd wkt before Ali Crick took 6-45. Mike Bishop scored 63* to take him to almost 800 league runs for Sale, whose comfortable win over Stockport Georgians left them 11 points clear of third place Romiley - whom they travelled to on the 11th. And what a cliffhanger it turned out to be, Romiley scoring 208-7 (Rob Booker 80) and then reducing Sale to 98-6 before youngster Saad Khan led a doughty rearguard, his 38 off 104 balls taking Sale to the

brink of safety before he fell, dramatically leaving no.11 Max Bishop under great pressure to survive three balls - which the junior did, to ensure Sale claimed the promotion prize. After a great season, Romiley, narrowly denied promotion at the last, thus mirrored their 1st XI counterparts fate on the same day. Warrington and Davenham, like their 1st XIs also did, went down. Two fabulous innings were the feature at Stockport Rd, Jordan Ruff making a brilliant 189 as Timperley reached 318-7 in 40 overs against Upton, for whom Sam Talbot scored 100 and Luca Di Stefano 84 in a total of 251. The week previous, Timpers' Matt Fletcher hammered 86 at no 10 in their 284-9 v Davenham.

In Div 2, Didsbury 2As beat Congleton by 121 runs and secured the title, holding off a spirited season long challenge from Widnes, who also had a big win on the final day by 182 runs over HB, the Widnes total of 296 including 76 extras! Ashton OM finished third while at the other end, a penurious campaign for both Upton and Tattenhall saw them occupying bottom spots.

3RD XI CRICKET

DIDSBURY 3s ARE CHAMPIONS

After the closest title race in many years in the Sunday Premier Division, Didsbury made it a third successive league and cup double, their fifth title in the last six completed seasons being achieved by just 7 points as they held off the challenge of Sale. Both teams won their final matches, Sale's 5 wkt win over Hyde proving to be not quite enough as Didsbury trounced Nantwich by 153 runs on the same afternoon. Heaton Mersey won an entertaining battle of the bottom two, scoring 201-7 to beat Grappenhall by 3 wkts. Marple & Compstall were already confirmed as Div 1 winners,



an easy win over bottom club Hale Barns rounding off an encouraging season for the new-look side, for whom James Reeve finished with the amazing analysis of 7-4-7-8. Timperley recorded a 119 run win over Brooklands to end as runners-up. Only George Muirhead (30) passed 20 for Toft before he became one of three wickets for Tom Bidwell, the end coming quickly on a lovely afternoon as captain Ryan Wilson received the trophy. It also meant a league and cup double for Didsbury on the same weekend.
