So we are indeed off again on another season that promises much, bringing with it that sense of positivity and enjoyment as the County league was again blessed with a dry (if chilly) first thing to get things going. Covid has not left us by any means, of course, and all of our cricket will still be affected to some degree by the reality of it. For example, umpires are under strict instructions not to allow saliva to be applied to the ball, although at the same time the feeling of a bit more 'normality' will return with umpires

able to hold bowlers' jumpers (but not caps or other headwear). There is also a new disciplinary reporting procedure in place, and all clubs will be reminded that over-rate stipulations will be applied now that the sanitizing breaks have been done away with. It is also a season of change for the County League with the newly formed Division 3 becoming the fourth grade of County League cricket. After the abrupt change of rules mid-season which led to such confusion in the Cheshire Cricket League in 2021, Port Sunlight and Cheadle Hulme, who finished first and second in CCL Div 1 now find themselves in the CCCL Div 2 (as they would have been under the previous system). You can see how they have been getting on, PS making their CCCL bow whilst the Grove Park outfit make a welcome return after a four year absence. In the new Division 3, six clubs have recent CCCL experience, most notably Barrow and Stockport, the bottom two last time round, whilst Poynton, relegated from Div 2 in 2014 and latterly merging and reforming with Disley to become N.E.Cheshire, have made an impressive start. Off the field, my understanding is that unless explicitly informed

otherwise, players and officials will provide their own teas. The arguments for and against have been heard across many meeting rooms and on social media forums, and has of course been featured within these pages too. My views on the subject are well known but there does seem to be disgruntlement at how the decisions have been reached. One other point is that administrative requirements will remain an essential part of club management, especially the registration of players and retention of team sheets. Ineligible players, however inadvertently done, can lead to heavy penalties for clubs, while team sheets at all matches are part of the league regulations.

I can only apologise that, in the end, a preseason newsletter proved to be beyond me, but with a particularly busy period of matches almost upon us, I have been working hard to get this first edition out at the very start of May, with another edition following in mid month, which will feature more news of 2nd XI matches, for which I had no space!

### 10 YEARS AGO

The 2012 season had a soggy start, with many games cancelled on the opening day. In the Premier Division, Oxton's Andy Birley grabbed the early season headlines with spells of 24.2-2-52-8 on day 1, his team squeaking home by just 4 runs against Toft, and then 14-10-9-6 on day 2 as Oxton won far more easily after skittling Didsbury for just 58. The other notable scalp on day 1 was at Moorside Rd where a bowling attack of Adam Syddall, Sumit Panda, Rana Malook and Kurt Edginton helped Urmston bowl Chester BH out for just 98. It was to be a very tight division all round, Nantwich claiming the title by just 12 points from Hyde, while, despite their first day glory,



Urmston (227 pts) were relegated by virtue of Toft (also 227) having won one more match than them, with Widnes (224) also going down. Neston (229) and Didsbury (231) just survived. In Division 1 a depressing first day (4 games off) saw eventual champions Bowdon muster just 144-4 in 50 overs, consequently losing to Sale, whilst the other side who would attain promotion, Grappenhall, beat Bredbury SM. In a Division 2 that included Poynton and Malpas, no side managed to pass 200 in the first two rounds, although eventual champions Middlewich beat a strong Timperley side at Stockport Rd on day 2.

## **CCCL PREMIER DIVISION**



#### APRIL 23

The opening round of Premier Division fixtures were played out against a generally bright but distinctly chilly backdrop, with four decisive wins, one tight squeak, and the relatively rare bird of a drawn game. The most resounding result was at Werneth Low, where a magnificent opening stand of 160 between captain Tom Partridge (86) and the returning Luke Young (77\*) set **Hyde** well on their way to an 8 wkt win over Widnes. There was the added cheer of five wkts on debut for Andrew Jackson after his move from Toft, who themselves lost to last season's runners-up **Didsbury.** Although boosted by having Lancs' Rob Jones in their ranks, Toft were depleted by two of their first teamers both having weddings. 6-31 from Dids' Liam Booth, including that of Jones for just 6, was the decisive factor as Marcus Fisher (72) and captain Nick Anderson (56) propelled the visitors to 254 and a 102 run win. Chester BH hosted promoted **Bowdon** in an entertaining affair at Filkins Lane, a superb 100 from Jack Tipton taking the visitors to a heartening 243-7, but it proved nowhere near enough against the always powerful Chester batting line up,

Alex Money (82) and Warren Goodwin (77) adding 115 before captain Harry Killoran's unbeaten 53 saw CBH to a 6 wkt win with almost 20 overs unused. The other promoted club **Brooklands** lost out by 66 runs as visitors Oxton bowled them out for 114. Joe Mennie taking 6-36. Earlier, Luke Filer's 77 helped the visitors total 180-8. Champions Nantwich were involved in the tensest finish. their 2 wkt win over AE coming in the 58th over of their reply. George Bell's 83 helped the hosts to 192, his stand off 55 for the 9th with **Dan Fesmer** crucial. Nantwich were 117-7 but, as so many times in 2021, the lower order, marshalled this time by Spencer Byatt (55\*) got them home. Danny Leech hit a brilliant 121 for OP in their clash with Neston, who were indebted to Ash Davis not just for 6-64, but also for his 13\* at no 11. as he and no.10 lan Gill batted out almost 12 overs for a draw.

#### APRIL 30

Three clubs made it two from two, Hyde making it two emphatic wins in a row with a 7 wkt win at

Didsbury, an unbeaten 88\* from Charlie Barnard in an unbroken stand of 115 for the 4th wkt the highlight in a match which featured 67 fours and 6 sixes. Oxton are another 100% side, a terrific win over Alderley Edge making it smiles all round. For the second week in a row, it was George Bell (65) who was the standout with the bat for AE who again gave their opponents three extra overs, again losing in the 58th. Champions Nantwich are also off to a perfect start, making short work of Toft after they knocked off 92 in under 10 overs. Bowdon produced a fabulous show at Oulton Park, after the hosts raced to 132-0 (Danny Leech 77). Rob Lord (6-51) led a brilliant revival as all 10 OP wkts went for 42 more runs, before an unflustered reply led by Jack Tipton (53) and Ross Zelem (54\*) gave the visitors an impressive 8 wkt win. Despite the heroics of AJ Hart (17 overs, 3 wkts, 59\* batting at 8) Brooklands could not quite do enough to chase a gettable looking 176 at Neston, all out 142 in a game that got away from them.

### **CCCL DIVISION ONE**



#### APRIL 23

An interesting round of results heralded the first week of Division 1 action. with six winners and six losers the result. The most emphatic winners were Macclesfield, who would have been as surprised as anyone to have beaten Cheadle by as big a margin as they did after totalling just 124 at Victoria Rd, and that only due to the last two wkts adding 46. The returning Craig Melrose then ran amok, returning 8-28 as Cheadle were bowled out for 68 in under 20 overs. The other side relegated from the 2021 Prem. Timperley. also tasted defeat at Alvanley, who were bolstered by both Jarryd Basson (80) and the world's best female ODI & IT20 bowler Sophie Ecclestone being available to play. Her 3-29 was part of an excellent team display as Alv won by 40 runs, Ed Galley's classy 85 not quite enough. Two clubs who almost got promoted last year met at the Rec, **Bollington** squeezing home in a fantastic game by 2 wkts against Bramhall, for whom Greg Dixon carried his bat for a magnificent 136\* as the visitors totalled 236-6. Struggling in reply, Bolly were revived by a fabulous 91\* off 77 balls from the bat of Tom Horsfield, who received just enough support from the lower order -

and 39 runs in the extras column - to take Bolly to victory with just two balls remaining. Moorside Rd also saw some great batting as **Grant Hodnett** hit 112\*, Grappenhall posting 233-4 against Urmston. The hosts were wobbling at 55-4 but promising youngster Sumit Panda hit a terrific 111\* which, with good support from the lower order, was enough for a 3 wkt win. Marple were another side to pull off a good comeback from a dicey position, recovering from 89-5 to chase the 182 they needed to overcome Congleton. Promoted **Lindow's** recovery from 88-7 to reach 168 at Sale was due mainly to Johan Wessels. who was run out nine short of a ton after a stylish 67-ball knock. Boosted by Pat Ashling in their ranks, Sale had few problems reaching their target with some 13 overs & 6 wkts in hand.

### APRIL 30

No side made it two from two, Marple ending April top of the early table after having had the better of their draw at Grappenhall, 86\* from Mark Makin tak-

ing them to 223-7. Grappers were indebted to an adhesive 61\* from Ben Bodha in their successful rearguard. The first of numerous lengthy trips for Alvanley culminated in a five wkt loss at Cheadle, who were pleased to shrug off the horrors of week one against an Alv team again having Sophie Ecclestone (3-35) available, Liam Fitzpatrick again top-scoring for the hosts. It was a tale of the shoe being on the other boot for Macclesfield. who saw Congleton recover from 127-8 to make 181 before themselves folding for just 87 with extras top scoring, four bowlers each taking four wkts each in the game. Urmston produced another impressive batting display, 89 from skipper Lewis Jackson the highlight of their 251-6 at Lindow, who lost a wkt to the first ball of their reply before being rallied by a magnificent 106 from Johan Wessels which took them agonisingly close to a win finishing on 241-8 in a great match which also featured 53 extras. Timperley took visitors Bollington for a massive 281-3 in just 48 overs, Jonathan Fletcher 110, Bolly never in the hunt as they were all out 174.94 from Pat Ashling & a quick 61 from Dan Newton powered Sale to 267-8 at Bramhall, who finished on 170-8.

### APRIL 23

Three decisive wins, two draws and a thriller summarises the opening day in Division 2. Said thriller occurred at Haslington, where visitors Christleton were bowled out for 156, captain Josh Morgan-Jones making 51. Lurching at 21-3 in reply, Haslington reached 121-4 before losing three more wkts without addition, and although the tail battled valiantly, the hosts were bowled out for 151 with some 11 overs remaining, in a match where six bowlers all took three wkts each. Flowery Field hosted a high scoring opening fixture as visitors Davenham, starting afresh after a difficult 2021, dealt with the loss of a wicket third ball to put together a healthy 234-6, led by the returning Sam Hunt (captaining this year) with 61. In reply, Stockport Georgians were given a flyer by **Ned Bailey** (72), who, along with Ben Jones, posted 120 in 20.2 overs for the opening wkt. Jones continued on and reached his hundred in the 49th over, hitting the winning runs next ball to give his side a famous 7 wkt win. The biggest win of the day occurred at Walton Lea where Warrington got their 2022 off with a win, grinding out an 8 wkt win over promoted Cheadle Hulme, although it took the hosts almost 47 overs to reach the victory target of 110, Muhammad Abid making 52. A high scoring draw at Upton, where Macca Hooton hammered 87 out of the first 116 for Ashton OM before his dismissal, which triggered a sharp decline in the scoring rate, but nonetheless their 219 looked enough. Upton gave it a real go, however, finishing on 196-7. Another Wirral club. Port Sunlight, made their County League debut hosting Mobberley, and will have been disappointed to see the visitors get to 196-8 after having them 107-7. Hamza Butt 51\*. A grim rearguard which included 15 off 71 balls from no.9 Matthew Howard saw PS finish on 138-9.

### APRIL 30

Stockport Georgians made a statement with a rapid demolition of Mobberley at Church Lane, Ned Bailey celebrating his elevation to the Cheshire ranks with a quickfire 54\* as the visitors were home and hosed in 40 overs of cricket. Assisted by 38 extras, Romiley raced to 263-6 at home to Warrington before calling a halt, Ans Mohammed 61 (113 with **Tom Rolph** for the 1st) David Badrock 60. The visitors were held together by a fine 91 from Richard Lyons as they finished 211-7. A highly entertaining run-fest at The Beets, where Macca Hooton's 81-ball 110 saw hosts Ashton OM make 251-9, as Jack Taylor took a hat-trick for visitors **Haslington**. Taylor then followed up with an exhilarating 80\* off just 40 balls as Has raced to their target off just 38.3 overs, Charlie Kemp 72, Matt Kennerley-Ryan 68. At Butchers Stile, a splendid 120 from Joshua Agar helped visitors Hale Barns to 232-8 which proved too much for Davenham who were all out 189. The last two Cheadle Hulme wickets added 64 as they wrung out 153-9 in their allocation at Grove Park against visitors **Upton** who were disappointed to be dismissed for 111 with some 11 overs unused. No details were available at time of writing regarding Christleton's high scoring draw with Port Sunlight.

# **CCCL DIVISION THREE**



### **APRIL 23**

It was a generally encouraging start in the 100 over format for the teams finding themselves in the new look CCCL Div 3. The two clubs most used to the format who were relegated last season, Barrow and Stockport, met at The Croft in what became a high scoring encounter. It didn't look that way when the hosts went from 79-1 to 96-5 before a 58-ball 76 from Phil Johnson and 62 from Chris Morrison took them to 224. In reply, a superb run-aball 115\* from Taimoor Malik, who combined with Calum Davies (57\*) to add an unbroken 113 for the 4th wkt. took Stockport to an impressive win with almost 10 overs in hand. Ashley racked up the highest total of the day, 117\* from **Imran Butt** the highlight of their 265-7 against Barnton, who were in the doodoo at 69-5 before a splendid 85\* from Joel Cross got them to 206-7. Maritime were another side to motor past 200, despite losing a wicket to the first ball of their game against Runcorn. Vensakar Kanthirai made an excellent 103\* as the hosts reached 231-6. The visitors lost a wicket fourth ball of their reply, and dug in for the draw, Rob Magee making 67 before becoming one of

three run out victims. North East Cheshire made 200-9 against Kingsley, with 'unsure' recording a nine wicket haul according to the scorecard. Kingsley were all out 167 in reply, five wickets for Will Westerby the standout performance. Winnington Park returned to County league action after a lengthy absence, entertaining Hawk Green and making 174-8, Alec Butcher 68. In reply, Jack Needham and Ollie Whisker both made half-centuries as the visitors claimed a four wkt win in the 42nd over. Oakmere were the other winners of day one, captain Craig Phelan making 56\* as his side reached the 86 needed with plenty in hand to claim a comfortable 8 wkt win at Tattenhall.

### APRIL 30

Will Westerby was again to the fore for NE Cheshire, his 6-37 seeing hosts Runcorn bowled out in 40.5 overs for just 139, Andrew Clarke's unbeaten 65 easing NEC to an encouraging 8 wkt win which put them on top after two games. An excellent all round performance from Barrow's Gareth Hughes was the lynchpin of their 9

wkt win at Barnton, Hughes making 90 after taking 3-44 to secure an emphatic win. It's not often that Tattenhall's batting has fired in recent times but at last it did after their epic odyssev across to Hawk Green. the visitors totalling 256-9 with Ethan-Jai Evans making 91\* off 61. Despite 74 from Elliott Young, HG couldn't get going and in increasing tension they were bowled out in the final over. A fine all-round performance from James Hodkinson was not quite enough for Oakmere to overcome visitors Ashley. Hodkinson first made 85 out of 219-7 and then took 4-47 as Ashley clung on to finish 183-9, Syed Azam Shah making 73. There was also plenty of encouragement for Maritime after their long ride to Cale Green to take on Stockport, Ali Suthaagaran taking 5-19 as the hosts were skittled for 115. Zafar Jatoi's 63 off 43 the only knock of substance. Maritime eased to their target with almost half their overs unused. The most notable feature of the draw between Kingsley and Winnington Park was that visitors WP didn't concede a single extra in the 50 overs they bowled, their last pair surviving 5.3 overs.

Although it's a number of years since their County League heydays, Middlewich's announcement of the death of Ray Davies in February drew tributes from all across the county. After representing the club's 2nd XI and Sunday teams, Ray became an umpire and then a

scorer, covering games for Cheshire League representative teams, and always retaining a great passion for his club, whom he served latterly as President.
