CHESHIRE WOMEN'S LEAGUE

Division One - July 28:

Stockport Georgians v Lindow: A dramatic second league win of the year for Georgians and second defeat for Lindow, with one run in 481 separating the sides after 80 overs dominated by the bat. Georgians maintained an almost uniform run rate of six runs per over throughout their innings of 241, spearheaded by Emily Thomas' unbeaten 105 from 115 balls. She was joined in significant stands of 75 for the first wicket with Skye Thomas (30) and 99 for third with Lucy Neill (59). Lindow replied with their own opening stand of 85 between Heidi Cheadle and Grace Hemsted, and when Cheadle passed three figures during a third wicket stand of 119 with Libby Ackerley, it very much looked like a famous run chase was on the cards. Emily Thomas though hadn't finished with playing a major role in this game, sending back Cheadle for 123 and Ackerley for 48. With more wickets for Gaby McKeever as the pressure built, there was an eighth wicket off the final ball when one was needed to tie and two to win. In such a batter dominated game, two bowlers stand out for their economical contributions, with Lindow's Ackerley conceding 19 runs in eight overs and Amelie Batey recording 2-28 for Georgians.

Nantwich v Didsbury: Nantwich lost their 100 per cent league record as their chase of 177 never really got going. Zara Matthews top scored with 33 in the Didsbury innings, where Beth Hughes took 3-23. The reply was notable for Jodie Filer's miserly overs at the start and for Pooja Singh running through the lower order as the hosts slumped to 122. Charlotte Neal top scored with 36.

August 4:

<u>Lindow v Oakmere:</u> After their fast start to the season, Lindow slumped here to a third league defeat in the last four. Unlike the previous week, when they were edged out in a run spree, this was a comprehensive defeat for the Wilmslow club. Kerry Hartnett took four wickets for no runs and Sarah Worsdale bagged three as Lindow were all out for 66, setting up a seven-wicket win.

<u>Didsbury v Chester Boughton Hall:</u> Didsbury moved into second place in the table after outplaying their opponents here. Chester lost their first three wickets without a run on the board, two of these to Pooja Singh, and things scarcely got better after that. Singh's final figures were 4-12, Isabelle Hevican took the last three wickets in the space of five balls and the final Chester total was just 41. A nine-wicket win was duly completed inside nine overs.

The league is now in a position to confirm this result. We also wish to highlight that only in very limited circumstances can a match in this division be re-arranged. Matches cannot, for example, be re-arranged due to general player unavailability, so clubs should not make re-arrangement requests of this nature and their opposition should not accept such requests.

July 28:

Greenfield v Upton: Before this round of matches, the highest successful run chase in league history was Chester Boughton Hall's 221 against Stockport Trinity in 2022. While many were wondering if this would be surpassed by Lindow in their first division match, the record had already fallen here to Upton. This was made all the more remarkable by the fact division two play fewer overs than the top-flight. Furthermore, this record here was broken by all of 38 runs, and with three overs in hand. After bowling out Hayfield for 25 the previous week, this was an altogether different experience for the Upton attack as they conceded 258. Greenfield's chief run getters were Megan Russell (107 from 83 balls) and Ella Owen (40 from 39). After being one of the bowlers who suffered at the hands of Russell and her team-mates, Lily Scudder produced a magnificent response with the bat for the Wirral side. Her 131 not out from 100 balls featured 21 fours and a six, with the chief support coming from Charlie Scudder with 51 from 52 balls.

August 4:

<u>Hawarden Park v Buxton</u>: After a difficult few weeks, Hawarden hung on to win here. Poppy Smith (63) top scored in their total of 167, but this looked very much in danger courtesy of another superb score from Buxton's Georgina Macey. Her 97 from 102 balls was not quite enough though, as some her team-mates were tied down by the Hawarden bowlers, and the Welsh club eventually recorded a five-run win.

An unbeaten 55 from Grace Carter and 37 from Ashlee Prince took them to a formidable total of 176. Poppy-Mae Shufflebotham's four wickets and Eleanor Beecher's three then ensured Alvanley were all out for 43.

Appleton 2nd XI v JG Meakin – JG Meakin unable to fulfil fixture on original date of 29/7 and will not be re-arranged, awarded to Appleton by forfeit.

Chester BH 2nd XI v Nantwich 2nd XI – unfit ground on original date of 14/5 and will not be rearranged, recorded as Cancelled.

A further reminder that the regulations require clubs to alert their opposition prior to any match where they have selected players in their 2nd or 3rd XI who regularly play for higher ranked teams at the club.

We would also like to warn clubs to follow the correct procedure regarding the submission of team sheets. It may seem to be overly formal what is outlined here, but doing it this way really is the best way to avoid any disputes:

- Care needs to be taken to ensure the team sheet is correct
- The sheet needs to be signed by a recognised team official, such as the coach, manager or captain
- If there is a desire to change any of the names on the sheet after the toss, the permission of the opposition captain must be obtained. We have sought advice from Duane Jones in his role as League Umpires & Scorers Officer, and he has said that it would be reasonable to enter the field of play at the fall of a wicket in order to seek this permission

As mentioned at the recent Committee meeting, clubs need to pay greater attention to match scorecard entries on Play Cricket. The League Executive no longer has the resources to check these, given the ever-increasing volume of fixtures, and it is again likely that end of season awards will be based on the Play Cricket statistics. In particular:

- Please ensure your bonus points are shown correctly these are explained in the relevant <u>competition regulations</u>
- Please ensure the wicketkeeper is identified in the team listings
- Please try to complete any Unsure player entries
- Please try to amend any player entries where they are not linked to their Play Cricket membership record – if you click on a player's name in a correctly completed scorecard, it should direct you to this record

With the league having decided to discontinue its Pitchero site, a number of general documents have now been uploaded to the Play Cricket site.

The <u>Cricket Playing Survey</u>, run by the ECB, provides a chance for recreational players and volunteers to have their say and influence the future of cricket at grassroots level. The survey is only open until August 12.
