
Cheshire Clubs' Cricket Committee (CCCC) Development Plan (2024-2026)



The **Cheshire Clubs' Cricket Committee (CCCC)** is one of the constituent members of Cheshire Cricket Board, with a primary responsibility to oversee the development of adult recreational cricket within the County.

Membership of the CCCC is open to any recreational club playing within the County borders, subject to signing an <u>'Affiliation</u> <u>Agreement'</u> with Cheshire Cricket Board (and ECB) and payment of the annual affiliation fee.

Cheshire's affiliated clubs are entitled to a comprehensive package of support, with services delivered by members of the CCCC Executive and staff from Cheshire Cricket Board. A full list of these services can be found on the <u>CCB website</u>.

The CCCC hold quarterly meetings at the County headquarters at Moss Farm (Northwich), to which all clubs and cricketing organisations in Cheshire are invited. This Development Plan outlines some of the key roles and responsibilities of the CCCC Executive, including any specific actions and tasks and key performance indicators, and is reviewed on an annual basis.
