CHESHIRE WOMEN'S LEAGUE

Division One - June 1:

Lindow 202-4 (37), Chester Boughton Hall 141-7 (37)

Chester Boughton Hall became the last team in the top-flight to lose their unbeaten record, while Lindow hit the top spot for the first time this year here. For the second week in succession, Heidi Cheadle reached three figures, and on this occasion stayed unbeaten with a score of 125 as the Wilmslow club topped three figures. Tanvee Karasagod-Pallath's 28 was the top score in the second innings as the Lindow attack kept a tight rein on things, with Faye Smith's 2-14 in eight overs the standout performance.

Leigh 180-5 (37), Oakmere 181-4 (36.3)

Title defenders Leigh slipped to a second defeat of the year as Kerry Hartnett's unbeaten 78 guided Oakmere to victory in the final over. Adelaide Mather's 118 from as many deliveries in the first innings thus proved to be in vain.

Stockport Georgians 93, Didsbury 94-3

Jodie Filer took 7-17 to join the limited list of bowlers in league history who have taken seven in a single match. After a stuttering start, Didsbury were guided home by Emily Wilkins (51*) and Ellie Micklewright (33).

June 8:

Lindow 228-6 (38), Stockport Georgians 134-6 (29.3)

Lindow cemented their lead with this win on faster run rate. Heidi Cheadle made 101 this time, from 89 balls, with 15 fours and a six, making it her third league century in succession. Oakmere's Shami Ahmed has previously achieved this 'hat-trick', but her three tons in succession spanned two seasons. Holly Topp supported her with 79, before Georgians top order suffered at the hands of Emily Page. She later returned to complete her five-wicket haul, and despite Gaby McKeever's 48, Georgians were always behind the required rate.

Didsbury 232-6, Nantwich 173-9

Another matchwinning centurion today as Roshini Prince-Navaratnam, who remained unbeaten on 108 from 96 deliveries as her Didsbury team racked up an imposing total. Beth Hughes' three wickets engineered a brief collapse at 101-5, before the Cheshire captain received the support of Jessye Sadler and Helen Johnson to boost the total. Hughes delivered the top score of the second innings, with 45, but Nantwich never threatened to pull off this big chase.

Leyland 144-8, Chester Boughton Hall 128

A second league win of the year for Leyland, achieved despite failing to capitalize on a very good start to their own innings. Olivia Cunliffe and Matilda MacLeod took them to 67-0, before Shree Dayama and Carys Lambe took charge with the ball. Charlotte Whitaker's 5-23 then delivered the coup de grace as Chester were dismissed short of the required total, despite Lambe continuing her excellent match with 37.

Oakmere 47, Leigh 53-1

This was altogether very different from the reverse fixture. Lucy Page took three early wickets and Oakmere never really put any partnerships together after that. Leigh completed the chase inside 10 overs with an unbeaten 31 from Ellie Mason.

Division Two - June 1:

Upton 222-5, Greenfield 167-2

Upton made it four wins from four here. Lily Scudder (96) and Charlie Scudder (63) both scored at better than a run per ball and added 121 together for the third wicket. Helen Smith contributed an unbeaten 61 in reply but her side fell well short of the target.

Didsbury 2nd XI 98, Hayfield 78

Didsbury maintained their 100 per cent record in completed matches, but Hayfield were just nine runs short of their revised target in this rain affected match. Hayfield's Emily Bell finished with a fine return of 5-11 in five overs, before another fine bowling performance in the second innings proved crucial for the result, as Louise Hevican took 4-13.

June 8:

Hayfield 110-7 (33), Northop Hall 111-2 (27.5)

Hayfield are still looking for a first win, as despite the loss of two early wickets, Northop Hall comfortably completed their chase via an unbroken stand of 95 from Hollie Sigsworth and Laura Nicholls.

Despite being made to fight all the way to their low target, Runcorn prevailed to maintain their unbeaten record.

Oxton 128-4, Grappenhall 116-7

A first win since their reformation for the Oxton team. Lucy Andrews and Molly Price played their part in posting a formidable total and, despite Nicky Oyler's best effort5s, Grappenhall fell short.

Bonus Points

The new facility on Play Cricket that automatically calculates bonus points has now been set up. It is no longer possible for club or league results administrators to make entries in the usual bonus point boxes.

There are, however, several situations to be mindful of:

Division 3 matches played over 20 overs per side. Here, the home team needs to change the entry in the Scheduled Overs box to 20 to ensure that batting points are calculated according to the correct run rate.

Reduced Overs Matches. If the number of overs available to the batting side is reduced due to ground or weather conditions, the home team needs to change the entry in the Scheduled Overs box to the appropriate revised figure to ensure that batting points are calculated according to the correct run rate.

Abandoned Matches. If the result is 'abandoned'. i.e. play commenced but there was insufficient play for a result, then an adjustment may need to be made. If the innings ran to at least 10 overs in Division 1, nine overs in Division 2, eight overs in a 30 over Division 3 match or five overs in a Division 3 or 4 match played over 20 overs, then no action is required. If the innings was curtailed prior to this, you need to make a request to a league administrator for a manual adjustment to ensure that no batting or bowling points are allocated for that innings.

Officials

Cheshire continues to offer its wide range of <u>umpiring and scoring courses</u>.

These include a new Umpires course at Woodley CC on the evenings of May 27 and June 10 from 1800 to 2130. The total cost is £70 but when you umpire any five matches (whether it's 50 overs or 16 softball overs or anything in between) you can register this with Cheshire Cricket Board and you will receive £35 of this cost as a refund. You will also get a free shirt, a few other goodies and the invitation to become a member of ECB ACO, which is free for the first year (another £30 saving). As a member you are insured (personal injury and some legal cover) from the moment you go to a match to when you are finished. The course is interactive and fun, you'll learn a lot about the game and how to umpire at certain situations and be safe at either bowler's or striker's end.

There is also a female only evening course at Bowdon Vale CC. This is not an official umpire or scorer course, but it gives a bit of insight into some of the main rules, takes away some myths

and covers some basic scoring and umpiring tips. The date to mark in your diary here is June 12 from 1900 to 2130. Bookings for this free course can also be made via the link above.

As communicated at the pre-season captains meeting, Division 1 of the CWCL will move to a system of appointed umpires from 2026. To be ready for this clubs need to ensure umpires are in an appointed listing, hold ACO membership (which includes DBS). Umpires may wish to attend refresher training, and these are promoted here when appropriate and across ECB Facebook pages including the Women and Girls Cricket in Cheshire page.

Fast Bowling Directive

The ECB restrictions on the number of overs that can be bowled by a fast bowler have been revised. A bowler is defined as 'fast' if it would be expected that an average wicketkeeper would normally stand back to their bowling.

Under 15 bowlers can only bowl five overs in a spell, with those in the Under 13 age group also restricted 10 overs in a day. Under 14 and Under 15 bowlers can bowl 12 overs in a day – remember that these are 'per day' restrictions and not 'per match', which may be relevant if a player features in two matches on the same day.

Under 16 and Under 17 bowlers can bowl six overs in a spell and 15 in a day.

Under 18 and Under 19 bowlers can bowl six overs in a spell and 18 in a day.

In any seven-day period, it is recommended there should be a maximum of four bowling days with only one instance of bowling on consecutive days.

The target maximum overs per week is 20 for an Under 13, 24 for an Under 15, 26 for an Under 17 and 28 for an Under 19.

Transgender Policy


Following the recent changes to the ECB's transgender policy, we would like to highlight this section from the national governing body's <u>Frequently Asked Questions</u> document on this subject:
