CHESHIRE WOMEN'S LEAGUE

Division One – June 29:

Leigh 176, Leyland 179-7

In previous seasons no team has won the league with three defeats, and if that is maintained this year, Leigh will not be retaining their title. Hannah Cook and Emma Duerden each took three wickets to restrict the champions, whose top scorer was Danielle Collins with 48. Isobel Cordingley's 60 led the way for Leyland in reply and Hannah Snape's 25 not out completed the job after a brief collapse had given Leigh hope.

Nantwich 156-5, Lindow 157-0

The teams in the box seat for now are Chester, with two defeats, and Lindow, who have still lost just the one. The Wilmslow club's openers eased past their target against a Nantwich team who still have just one win across all competitions. Beth Hughes top scored for Nantwich with 49, before the explosive batting of Holly Topp (75*) and Heidi Cheadle (73*) completed the win inside 20 overs. You suspect that Cheadle may well have made her fourth league century in succession had her side not got over the line earlier?

Stockport Georgians 139, Oakmere 140-3

Oakmere secured a potentially vital victory in the bottom half of the table here. Georgians started rapidly – in an innings where Gracie Whittle was the top scorer with 42, the really rapid scoring came from Amelia Sammons, who reached 37 from 23 balls before falling to the bowling of Annie Rashid, the former Appleton player who is the league's all-time leading wicket taker and who was making a first appearance for her new club. Emily Faulkner took 3-14 in the middle order as the Georgians batting fell away. Natalie Lyons wasted no time in getting into her groove when opening the batting in reply and it was her stand of 86 for the second wicket with Rachel Warrenger that really saw the Northwich club take charge of the game. Lyons eventually fell for 73 from 99 balls with three sixes.

July 6:

Didsbury 134, Lindow 138-0

Didsbury were struggling early on here at 19-3 after Emily Page's opening salvo. Their final total was boosted by Roshini Prince-Navaratnam's 54, but it was always doubtful whether 134 would be competitive. Perhaps what wasn't expected was that there would be time for Heidi Cheadle to complete a fourth century in five matches. Holly Topp is a fine player in her own right who has enjoyed not inconsiderable success in the league, but here she was content to play second fiddle with 22 from 43 balls as Cheadle well and truly lit up a gloomy afternoon in Wilmslow from the other end. Her final remarkable total was 107 from 62 balls with 20 fours and two sixes, with the century itself coming from 58 deliveries, and was this one of the league's all-time greatest innings?

Leigh 222-4, Chester Boughton Hall 205-7

Ellie Mason's 82 led the way to a fine total for Leigh, with Sophie Heaton contributing 67 not out. It all left Chester facing a record chase to win the match, and at 0-2 after eight balls, a comprehensive Leigh win was on the cards. That the champions were made to sweat on their victory was a remarkable effort from Chester thereafter, with Holly Mayers top scoring with 73, Holly Cooke making 59 and Georgia Munro 37. It took Chester to the 'three losses' mark as well, so if the previous years can be used as a benchmark, Lindow are in a title race of one, having just a single defeat. One suspects there may be more twists over the next two months though.

Tanvee Kasaragod Pallath made 55 and Shree Dayama 35 as Chester posted a formidable total. Layla Dwyer made 55 in the reply, but Dayama took two cheap wickets to help ensure Oakmere fell short.

June 29:

An all-round Chester bowling performance paved the way for this victory, as they used eight bowlers, none of whom bowled more than 25 balls, and seven of them took at least one wicket, indeed Zavial Payne was the only one to claim a second scalp.
